#### PROFESSOR BRENDA VOLLING

How do fathers matter for young children's development?
Let us count the ways!

Brenda Volling is a developmental psychologist and the Lois Wladis Hoffman Collegiate Professor of Psychology at the University of Michigan. Her research focuses on early social and emotional development with infants, toddlers

and preschoolers, parent-child interaction, and family relationships, with a special interest in fathers. She works mostly with young fathers during the perinatal period and the transition to fatherhood and studies men's mental health, father-child relationships, and coparenting. She has received funding from the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD for her research and was the recipient of a career development award from NICHD. Her research has been showcased on CBS Sunday Morning, the BBC, the Washington Post, New York Times, and Parents magazine. Currently, she is working on psychoeducational supports for parents undergoing the transition to parenthood and the birth of a second child, as well as programs to support fathers with young children. In recent years, she has provided fatherhood researchers with critical 'state of the field' summaries, synthesising knowledge, gaps and directions for future work.

Co-creating a fatherinclusive practice and policy ecosystem: insights from young fathers and family support in the UK


Anna Tarrant is a Professor of Sociology at the University of Lincoln in the UK, a UKRI Future Leaders Fellow and Director of the Centre for Innovation in Fatherhood and Family



Research. Established in 2023, the Centre aims to support and promote cutting-edge, interdisciplinary research that underpins research, training, consultancy, and evaluation in the areas of father-inclusion and family welfare. Anna is also the Chair of Trustees of the North East Young Dads and Lads, a national specialist support charity for young fathers and their families. Building from a UKRI funded Future Leaders Fellowship study called 'Following Young Fathers Further', Anna currently leads an impactful qualitative longitudinal, participatory study of the parenting journeys and support needs of young fathers. Through this research she has pioneered longitudinal co-creation methods to improve support with and for young fathers and to promote and advocate for father-inclusion as part of a gender equality and social justice agenda. Key innovations from the study include the co-creation of the Grimsby Dads Collective, DigiDAD, and the Father-inclusion Hub, a living archive of 'what works' in effectively engaging with men as-fathers.

Anna's recent books include <u>Fathering and Poverty</u> (2021), <u>Men, Families and Poverty</u> (2023), Men and Welfare (2022) and <u>The Dynamics of Young Fatherhood</u> (2024).

A decade of dads: an impressionistic history

Celebrating 10 years of the Australian Fatherhood Research Symposium

A lot can happen in 10 years, not just to an individual but to a social movement. If you imagine social changes as waves moving through years, then fatherhood research from 2015 to 2025 looks to me like quite a swell. Not a tsunami, but a wave with height and shape, one you'd certainly like to catch. I'll be describing some of the splashes along the ride of fatherhood research, the ones that impressed me anyway.

Richard Fletcher is Associate Professor in the Fathers and Families Research Program at The University of Newcastle, NSW. He has been conducting programs and research with fathers and families for over 30 years and was the co-convenor of the Australian Fatherhood Research Network for 10 years. His current research includes Indigenous fathers' strengths; Father's role in families with Post Natal Depression; Father-infant attachment; eHealth and web-based support for fathers; and Fathers' role in maternal mental health and in the event of stillbirth. Richard is the Principal Investigator for SMS4Dads and SMS4Deadly Dads.

Established over 100 years ago, Tresillian is Australia's largest early parenting organisation with Centres in Sydney, regional NSW, the ACT, and now Tasmania with a Centre to open in Launceston later this year. Tresillian supports parents to gain confidence, through evidence-based education on baby's feeding, sleep and settling and toddler behaviour, and their own mental health. Our mission is to prioritise the holistic well-being of the whole family. Tresillian is also a leader in professional development for health professionals. Our most recent workshop focussed on 'Including Dads in the First 2000 Days'. It was an enriching day of collaboration aimed at developing innovative approaches to enhance the inclusion of fathers.

Tresillian offers a comprehensive range of parenting services:

- More complex cases are referred to our Residential facilities for a 4 nights/5 day or opt for a virtual Residential program.
- Day services consist of 2-hour face-to-face or virtual consultations with a Tresillian nurse; parenting groups, and the option for counselling for perinatal mental health issues such as postpartum depression and anxiety.

# ABOUT THE AUSTRALIAN FATHERHOOD RESEARCH CONSORTIUM

The **Australian Fatherhood Research Consortium** (AFRC) formed in 2017 with three key aims:

- (i) to advance the science of fatherhood;
- (ii) to inform practice and policy that supports men and their families; and
- (iii) to promote healthy inclusion of fathers in family life.

To guide the AFRC collaboration, four groups have been formed, specialising in different aspects of research and practice.

The **Data Analysis** group was created to enable better collaboration across studies with research data on fathers and is led by A/Prof. Jacqui Macdonald of Deakin University.

The **Intervention** group was created to bring together researchers, practitioners, and policy makers interested in contributing to the development and evaluation of intervention programs for fathers and is led by Dr. Levita D'Souza of Monash University.

The **Literature Review** group was formed to evaluate and synthesise the existing literature on fathers and is led by Dr. Karen Wynter of Monash University.

The **Science Communication** group was formed to translate the AFRC group's findings from the research domain into the public domain to raise the profile of fathers in policy and practice. It is led by David Hawkins.





SEED Lifespan recognises the seminal role that experiences in early emotional life have on social development, that every age and stage matters in building wellbeing, and that confidence in holding positive and painful emotion is essential to felt security across the lifecourse.



SEED Lifespan's Lifecourse Sciences Theme aims to improve our understanding of the developmental origins of mental health and disorder. This area of work is guided by our population based longitudinal studies of social-emotional development, including the Men and Parenting Pathways (MAPP) Study. It supports research into the developmental origins of mental health and disorder, within and across generations.


